


When Covid came along

- Sheer volume of data → newsdesk needed our skill set almost daily
- 5 years 338 stories ½ since March 106 of 112 about Covid
- Audience developed an appetite for statistics
- Data/science journos act as translators both for newsdesk & readers
- Too many figures confuses more than illuminates
- Statistics = nuance...very hard to put across in 400-700 words

How hard can it be to count deaths?*

- From the very beginning we knew deaths (not cases) best metric
- Identified statistical bodies as best count (but with a time lag)
- NOT United Kingdom of data (DHSC, PHE, NHSE, ONS, NRS, NISRA)
- Covid deaths vs excess
- International counting methods (Johns Hopkins)
- Confusion and pushback from readers
- Politicisation of data? Culture wars?
